Course Description

Course in two parts concentrating alternately on written literature and oral literature:

The purpose of this section on written literature is to navigate the texts, the excerpts of emblematic works, to analyze and study the statements made by this literature of the hot and urgent questions of the present day. The themes of cultural identity, the place of Africa in history, the European adventure, the process of colonialism, the disillusionment of independence and finally the emergence of the voices of women and migrants will be addressed. The emphasis will also be placed on the narrative and stylistic specificities of these texts.

• The section of oral literature invites one to discover and explore the literary forms woven in African languages and closely associated with the profound life of traditional societies.

The course will initiate an introduction to methods of approach and analysis of oral texts (talesmyths-epics-funny stories) addressed in their own cultural context, in a situation of performance, as well as their resurgence, in other forms, in a contemporary urban environment.

As part of the course, meetings are planned with renowned speakers, specialists on the topics covered:

- Oral Literature: Professor Mamoussé Diagne covering the theme "Civilization of the Orality" and M. Lamane Mbaye.
- Written Literature: The writers Boubacar Boris Diop and Aminata Sow Fall.

Course Objectives

The overall objective is to collectively construct the skills of reading, analyzing and understanding to apprehend, in its two verses (oral and written), the specific meanings, stakes and scope of a literature as rich as fruitful, mirror of a rapidly changing society.
