

DEPARTURE AND RETURN IN FRANCOPHONE FICTION IN THE MAGHREB

Course Description

This course critically analyzes the back-and-forth movement between France and the Maghreb in a corpus of Francophone novels, examining the cultural perspectives and personal trajectories of characters who experience either exile, return, or a feeling of in-between-ness (crossing). It interrogates the chronotype of territorial displacement in fiction writing, by situating this displacement in a larger imaginary: that of the departure for the promised land and of the return -- often plagued by disenchantment and leading to an "archeology of the self". Rather than separating these two imaginaries (promised land/return and disenchantment), the course examines the dialectical relationship between these movements and the way they impact writing and cultural representation of self and other.

Course Objectives

- To familiarize students with North African diaspora literature and literature of displacement.
- To understand and critically analyze the imaginary characterizing territorial and cultural displacement in these writings.
- To comment on the relationships between time and space by deconstructing the narrative point of view.
- To compare the way various texts deal with the same issue of exile, displacement and return.
