Course Description

Social movements offer a unique angle from which to approach the political, social, and cultural construction of Morocco from the point of view of the people. While social change usually takes place slowly and gradually, social movements, as organized mass phenomena, accelerate transitions and can be read as direct expressions of how the people of a specific community view their reality and seek to improve it. In this course, we examine social movements in Morocco and in the MENA region, with particular attention to their relationship to traditional party politics and to their dynamics in authoritarian and semi-authoritarian contexts. We consider the role of social media in shaping social movements and ask what part economic realities and ideology (Islamic or otherwise) play in explaining the dynamics of change. Finally, we look at their composition and try to understand who is most likely to partake in them and why (youth/age factor, gender, etc).

To give students from different disciplines access to similar tools of analysis, this course introduces:

3. An overview of the Moroccan history
